

**Responsible Pet Ownership DO WE CARE ENOUGH?** 

Are we ever going to solve the problem of our dog/cat overpopulation? You would have thought that on an Island as small as ours, it really wouldn't be an insurmountable task.

Year after year, all our Sanctuaries are overflowing and there are still more animals on the street. **Our previous Government** worked hard at tackling the problem and early indications are that our present Administration aims behaviour influences people's to continue the work, alb eit with a different process.

When one adopts a cat or dog, what exactly does one have in mind? We call them 'companion animals' - that should give us a clue. They (the animals) are only too aware of what they are meant to be, would like to be and look to us (sometimes mistakenly) for guidance. In fact whether bringing up an animal or a child, the same dedication is required in the early years. The advantage with dogs is that they love to be trained!.

Why do people think it is acceptable to close their dogs out of their house at night? Apart from increasing their chance of contracting Sand fly Fever out there? And don't they think they might be upsetting their neighbours too?

Unfortunately, this kind of perception of animals and it is what causes the sometimes unreasonable legislations that prevents us from having our pets in our new apartments (now, inundating our Island) and our outside spaces.

Around the globe, people live in flats and often, they are able to have their pets live with them. This is because they bring them up well and are considerate of their neighbours. Is it asking too much for us to do the same? If we want to see some empathy with our beloved animals, this kind of practice is necessary.

At the SPCA we are well aware that training a dog doesn't always come naturally (and maybe this is a relatively new concept).

Therefore, we are very happy to offer adopters the benefit of our help in those first weeks. We know our dogs, their likes and dislikes and this might help them settle into their new home a little quicker and so make life easier for both new owner and

A new initiative coming from the Swiegi Council with ourselves and DogsTrust is looking very promising. Firstly, the Council is doing its utmost to help the residents be responsible pet owners by providing enough 'Poo bins' so that picking up the poo isn't such an inconvenience. As well as that, residents are receiving mail to remind them of their responsibilities.

Secondly, the Council is tackling the issue of obedience training for dogs. It is putting on a community event later in the summer, (8th September) which will be a fun evening for all the residents (and those who would like to join in). DogsTrust and SPCA will also be there to demonstrate 'Clicker Training' your dog.

As we know, Malta is vastly populated and unless we can agree the 'give and take' of living in such close proximity with our pets, it's only going to get more difficult.

Animals are very much a part of our lives, whether they are on a farm, drawing a carriage, in the sea or in our homes. If we respect and care for them, they can make our lives so much richer. It is all a question of balance.

Unfortunately we find ourselves running around too much for financial gain, when really, if we were to stop and 'smell the daisies', the simple things in life, we would appreciate what we have around us so much more and get through our busy days

So, to come back to where we started.....

If we cared a little more and took pet ownership a little more seriously, we would have fewer animals uncared for and unwanted AND on the street.



#### It's easy to be a great dog owner if you follow these 12 simple steps:

- 01. Obey all laws concerning your dog. Get your dog the proper license and vaccinations. Follow the leash laws and always clean up after your dog.
- 02. Try to spend at least a half hour or more per day playing with your dog. You don't want him to feel lonely.
- 03. Know about the importance of spraying or neutering your dog. Learn more about it before you make any decision.
- 04. Give your dog the best veterinary care you can afford. Don't forget yearly checkups, dental check-ups and vaccinations.
- 05. Give your dog lots of exercise. It's important for his health and wellness.
- 06. Get your dog's papers in order. Make sure he has the proper license, micro chip and ID tags.
- 07. Your dog loves you so much. Try and return the favour. Be a best friend to your dog and let him know how much you love him. Don't punish, beat or hurt your dog. Always treat your dog with love and kindness.
- 08. Be sure to always clean up well after your dog. This prevents infections and illness.
- 09. Bond with your dog by grooming him several times per week.
- 10. Your dog needs proper nutrition. Buy him the best dog food you can afford.
- 11. Teach your dog to be social and get along well with others. Take him to areas where there will be other people and dogs around, like a park.
- 12. Train your dog. To feel fulfilled, your dog needs and wants to be trained.

Hopefully, these simple rules for dog owners will help you to be a better dog owner. Be a good owner and your dog will be a good pet.



## FROM TRAINING TO SOCIALISATION









We all live in a yellow submarine....??????





At Dogs Trust Malta the ball is always rolling and it rolls only for the dogs. We've spent three years telling everyone about the benefits of neutering and micro-chipping and about responsible ownership and what dogs need. Many did not understand before that compromising on one of those needs would lead to problems directly or indirectly.

Training can and will help you have a well-behaved and predictable dog. The most effective way to have a well-behaved dog, still too often ignored, is socialisation. Socialisation is the process of getting used to other people and animals and learning to cope with different experiences and stimuli in the world around you. Getting this right will ensure you can take your dog with you anywhere without problems.

The earlier you start socialising your dog the better results you will have. However socialisation isn't simply going to the park and letting your dog loose to run and play with the other dogs. You must make sure to keep the experience positive. If you are not supervising, your dog might get bullied and learn to fear certain types of dogs.

#### Here are some simple rules to follow:

- Introduce your dog to everything that will form part of his daily life. That may be dogs, cats, children, loud noises, transport and so on. Make a list so you know you've covered all of them.
- Don't do too much at one go. Introduce things in small doses and gradually build up the exposure. Doing too much, too soon, may have the opposite result and scare the dog.
- Get him used to dogs of all kinds as long as they are all vaccinated. Carry your puppy until he has had all his vaccinations.
- Let him meet a variety of people and children.
- Allow him to hear unusual sounds.

- If he shows worry at any time remove him from that situation and try again later, in a situation of less intensity.
- Reward him for calm and relaxed behaviour.
- Reward him for ignoring sounds, sudden movements, small cage animals, reward him for exploratory behaviour with other dogs, people and perhaps cats, although if the cats are unfriendly you'll need to teach the dog to ignore them. You decide how you want him to behave and you reward that behaviour.
- Don't ever stop. Like other skills, if unused, social behaviour can be lost and forgotten. Dogs actually need canine company to fulfil their 'dogginess' and need regular opportunities to meet other dogs.

#### So how does one go about sponsoring an animal at the SPCA?


- 1. Firstly obtain an SADC sponsorship form using one of the following methods:

## **SPCA Cat Sponsor** JODIE NELSON

"One of the cats became very vocal and really wanted to communicate with me."

'When I first arrived in Malta. I was surprised to see stray cats on the streets near my hotel in St. Julian's. I was instantly worried about their safety, and I felt that my trip was ruined. Every evening I watched the colony of cats near mv hotel and I started giving them food and water. While feeding the colony, other cats would visit who didn't look so healthy, including a cat with an injured tail. I also saw two kittens and a mother cat. In addition, the cats would sometimes fight with each other. That night I sat by the pool of my hotel and cried. I continued to feed the cats every evening, took some photos, and started looking up animal rescue organisations on the internet. After a few days, the cats became friendly towards me. and I was able to play with some of the cats and I could see that they would make great pets. One of the cats became very vocal and really wanted to communicate with me. Some of the quieter cats also wanted to get close, and would sit

a few feet away from me, including the cat with the injured tail, who stared deeply into my eyes. I was very sad to leave the cats behind after my holiday, but I decided to keep looking for ways to help them. I have now sponsored two cats through the SPCA called Felix and Alley. I also emailed the SPCA to tell them about my experience, and I am very happy that they were able to inspect the colony straight away, talk to the local people nearby, and get back to me with their findings and suggestions to help these cats with medical checks and neutering. I am happy to fund this project and receive photos back from the SPCA showing the cats that are helped. I really did not want to walk away and do nothing. It would be great if more people could get involved and give a little bit of money to help with neutering, or contact the SPCA to ask about feeding stations for stray cats. It's great to feed the cats, but they also need fresh water and a safe area for their food'.
